Investment Objective

The objective of the fund is to create long-term wealth for investors by extracting alpha from equity markets.

Fund Profile

The portfolio is managed as a long/short hedge fund, focused on extracting alpha returns from the South African equity market. The funds returns are delivered through fundamental knowledge of South African equities vis-à-vis economic growth and broad economic themes as well as medium to long -term relative valuation opportunities, generating the largest portion of its returns through its directional bias. Relative value pairs, together with absolute longs and shorts seek to stabilize returns in turbulent market conditions, supported by the adjustment to the net exposure.





Market Commentary

After five consecutive months of positive returns, global equity markets took a pause during October. A sharp increase in US bond yields, a stronger US dollar, heightened geopolitical risk, and domestic political uncertainty in the US all contributed to this pullback. Markets outside the US, particularly emerging markets, experienced more significant declines.

At the start of October, US bond yields rose on the back of stronger-than-expected labour market data, confirming that the US economy remains resilient despite the prevailing high-interest rate environment. The second leg of the bond yield increase was driven by a higher probability of a Trump victory in the US presidential election. The rise in yields reflects market expectations that Trump's proposed tax cuts, trade tariffs, and deregulation policies will be reflationary, raising concerns about escalating fiscal risks. A steepening yield curve, driven by an increase in the term premium, further reinforced these concerns. By the time Donald Trump was officially announced as the US president, bond markets had already priced in the heightened risks and uncertainties associated with this political shift.

Emerging market assets came under pressure during this period as the US dollar strengthened significantly. Compounding these challenges, economic data from China remained weak, confirming that the country is trapped in a deflationary cycle. Nevertheless, there are signs that Chinese authorities are prepared to take more aggressive measures to support the economy. The People's Bank of China cut interest rates and announced additional policy measures to support the property market and developers.

Industrial metal prices declined in October, while oil prices rose slightly, driven by escalating tensions in the Middle East. Gold benefitted from increased demand driven by rising geopolitical uncertainty.

In South Africa, domestic assets also faced pressure, primarily due to external factors. However, recent economic data, such as retail sales, vehicle sales, credit growth, and consumer confidence have shown some improvement, suggesting that the second half of the year may deliver stronger growth. Furthermore, falling inflation and larger-than-expected withdrawals from the two-pot pension system are expected to provide additional support to consumption. The medium-term budget, however, was somewhat disappointing, with fiscal slippage coming in larger than expected. Spending was higher than anticipated, although much of the overspending is attributed to incentives for early retirement and increased spending on infrastructure. Revenue projections were also conservatively set.

SA local equity indices were down in October, with the All Share Index falling 0.9%. The ALBI underperformed equities, down 2.2%, as the rand weakened 1.9% to R17.60 versus the US dollar. Resources (+3%) outperformed financials (-0.7%) and industrials (-2.8%). Key sector leaders were Precious Metals (+10.2%) and Food Producers (+2.6%), with key performing names including Anglo American Platinum (+11.1%) and Gold Fields (+7.9%). Laggards included Chemicals (-12.1%) and Beverages (-7.9%). MSCI South Africa fell 2.9%, underperforming MSCI World (-2.0%) but outperforming MSCI EM (-4.4%) in US dollar terms.

The fund declined 3.4% during October. The largest contributors to positive performance were long positions in Goldfields (+0.6%), AngloGold (+0.5%), and Anglo American Platinum (+0.2%). A long position in the Palladium ETF also contributed, as did short positions in discretionary names. Short positions in the platinum miners detracted most during October, while long positions in other miners also hurt fund performance during the month.

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Net Asset Value (NAV):

Means net asset value, which is the total market value of all assets in a portfolio including any income accruals and less and deductible expenses such as audit

Standard Deviation:

The deviation of the return of the portfolio relative to its average. The greatest peak to trough loss until a new peak is reached.

Volatility refers to uncertainty and risk related to size of change of an instrument or portfolio. It is a statistical measure of the dispersion of returns for a given security or market index. Volatility is proportional to the directional exposure of a portfolio and is measured by Value at risk (VaR) which is a statistical technique used to measure and quantify the level of volatility.

Concentration and Sector

A large proportion of total assets invested in specific assets, sectors or regions. Concentrated positions or concentrated sectors in a portfolio will material

impact the returns of the portfolio more so than diversified portfolios. A measure that determines how assets move in relation to each other. Correlation risk arises when the correlation between asset-classes change. Correlation

risk also arises when the correlation within an asset-class changes. Examples of correlation within asset classes include equity pairs trading, fixed income curve trading and commodities pairs trading. Applies to investment in shares or derivatives based on shares. The market price of shares varies depending on supply and demand of the shares. Equity risk is

the risk of loss due to the drop in the market price of shares. Equity risk can either be systematic risk which is risk to the entire market based on political and economic indicators or unsystematic risk which is company specific and includes risk relating to company profits, future prospects and general consensus on

the company or sector.
