
Investment Objective

The objective of the fund is to create long-term wealth for investors by extracting alpha from equity markets.

Fund Profile

The portfolio is managed as a long/short hedge fund, focused on extracting beta and alpha returns from the South African equity market. The funds returns are delivered through fundamental knowledge of South African equities vis-à-vis economic growth and broad economic themes as well as medium to long -term relative valuation opportunities, generating the largest portion of its returns through its directional bias. Relative value pairs, together with absolute longs and shorts seek to stabilize returns in turbulent market conditions, supported by the adjustment to the net exposure.





Market Commentary

Global equity markets performed well during November, led by US equities, as Donald Trump won the US presidential election in a red sweep. Trump's proposals to cut taxes and accelerate corporate deregulation boosted equities. However, his fiscal stance and proposed tariff hikes, as well as planned curbs on immigration, have raised concerns that US inflation may re-emerge, reducing the scope for ongoing Fed rate cuts. As a result, bond yields initially rose while the US dollar appreciated. This, along with underwhelming fiscal support in China, led to underperformance from emerging markets.

The S&P 500 reached an all-time high, aided by resilient economic data and signs that the consumer remains healthy despite softer spending trends. US bond yields fell late in the month as Trump picked Scott Bessent, a well-respected macro hedge fund manager, to become Treasury Secretary, allaying fears around fiscal policy. European bond yields fell sharply as investors anticipated quicker interest rate cuts from the European Central Bank on the back of soft inflation, weak economic data, and political crises in both Germany and France. The euro fell sharply

Geopolitical tensions remain elevated as Ukraine conducted strikes into Russian territory. A ceasefire between Israel and Hezbollah, however, eased tensions in the Middle East, contributing to a slight decline in oil prices.

In China, bond yields fell along with the RMB, signalling ongoing concerns about growth and the potential impact of tariffs. Farly in the month, China announced a package to support local government debt restructuring. While the measures will support activity, the lack of new stimulus has disappointed the market. Economic data has improved on aggregate, but consumer confidence remains depressed.

In South Africa, economic data such as retail sales, vehicle sales, credit growth, and consumer confidence have shown improvement over the past few months. Inflation continued to fall, now below 3%, which allowed the SARB to cut interest rates by another 25 bps to 7.75%. This contributed to local bonds performing well during the month, along with stocks exposed to the South African economy.

Precious metals had their weakest month this year, with Gold down 3.7%, Silver down 6.2%, and Platinum falling 4.5%. Bitcoin surged by 38.5% on Trump euphoria. European natural gas futures rose 17.8% on geopolitical concerns.

In November, SA local equity indices were down, with the Capped Swix falling 0.9%. The ALBI outperformed equities, rallying 3.1%, as the rand weakened 2.5% to R18.09 versus the US dollar. Financials (+0.5%) and industrials (+0.5%) outperformed resources, which fell 6.6%. Key sector leaders were Tobacco (+12.0%) and General Retail (+7.1%), with key performing names including Spar (+13.4%) and Mr Price (+12.5%). Laggards included Precious Metals (-11.1%) and Beverages (-8.2%). MSCI South Africa fell 4.5%, underperforming MSCI World (+4.5%) and MSCI EM (-3.7%) in US dollar terms.

The Fund underperformed its Capped Swix benchmark by 2.5% during November. The largest contributors to outperformance were short positions in the platinum sector (+1.2%) and long positions in discretionary retailers (+0.6%). Long positions in gold equities (-0.8%) and short positions in consumer staple companies (-1%) contributed most to underperformance.

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Net Asset Value (NAV) :

Means net asset value, which is the total market value of all assets in a portfolio including any income accruals and less and deductible expenses such as audit

Highest & Lowest Return:

Annualised Return:

Total Investment Charges (TIC%):

= TER (%) + TC (%): The Total Investment Charges (TIC), the TER + the TC, is the percentage of the net asset value of the class of the Financial Product incurred

as costs relating to the investment of the Financial Product. It should be noted that a TIC is the sum of two calculated ratios (TER+TC).

Standard Deviation :

The deviation of the return of the portfolio relative to its average. The greatest peak to trough loss until a new peak is reached.

Sharpe Ratio:

The ratio of excess return over the risk-free rate divided by the total volatility of the portfolio.

Sortino Ratio:

Drawdown:

The ratio of excess return over the risk-free rate divided by the downside deviation of the portfolio. A number between -1 and 1 indicating the similarity of the dispersion of returns between the portfolio and another asset or index with 1 being highly correlated, -1

Correlation:

highly negatively correlated and 0 uncorrelated.

Value at Risk (VaR):

Value at risk is the minimum loss percentage that can be expected over a specified time period at a predetermined confidence level.

Leverage/Gearing:

The use of securities, including derivative instruments, short positions or borrowed capital to increase the exposure beyond the capital employed to an

investment.

Fund Risk

Leverage Risk:

The Fund borrows additional funds, trades on margin or performs short sale trades to amplify investment decisions. This means that the volatility of a hedge fund

portfolio can be many times that of the underlying investments due to leverage on a fund.

Derivative Risk:

Volatility Risk:

Derivative positions are financial instruments that derive their value from an underlying asset. Derivatives are exposed to implicit leverage which could result in

magnified gains and/or losses on the portfolio.

Counterparty Credit Risk:

Counterparty risk is a type of credit risk and is the risk of default by the counterparty associated with trading derivative contracts. An example of counterparty

credit risk is margin or collateral held with a prime broker.

Volatility refers to uncertainty and risk related to size of change of an instrument or portfolio. It is a statistical measure of the dispersion of returns for a given security or market index. Volatility is proportional to the directional exposure of a portfolio and is measured by Value at risk (VaR) which is a statistical technique used to measure and quantify the level of volatility.

Concentration and Sector

A large proportion of total assets invested in specific assets, sectors or regions. Concentrated positions or concentrated sectors in a portfolio will material impact the returns of the portfolio more so than diversified portfolios.

Correlation Risk:

A measure that determines how assets move in relation to each other. Correlation risk arises when the correlation between asset-classes change. Correlation risk also arises when the correlation within an asset-class changes. Examples of correlation within asset classes include equity pairs trading, fixed income curve

trading and commodities pairs trading.

Equity Risk:

Applies to investment in shares or derivatives based on shares. The market price of shares varies depending on supply and demand of the shares. Equity risk is the risk of loss due to the drop in the market price of shares. Equity risk can either be systematic risk which is risk to the entire market based on political and economic indicators or unsystematic risk which is company specific and includes risk relating to company profits, future prospects and general consensus on the

company or sector

Portfolio Valuation & Transaction Cut - Off

Portfolios are valued daily. The cut off time for processing investment subscriptions is 14:00pm on a business day.

Total Expense Ratio
